#### **Bringing It All Together:**

Philippians 3:20–21 reminds Christ-followers that our citizenship is in heaven. We belong to God's Kingdom, which Jesus told Pilate is not of this world. Jesus intentionally resisted appeals to earthly power. He submitted Himself to the authority of Rome, rather than proving that His Kingdom is more powerful than earthly kingdoms through demonstrations of earthly power or politics. We live as exiles and ambassadors — representatives of this other-worldly Kingdom — in a place that is not our home. But our citizenship is secure in Jesus, and we eagerly await the opportunity to be home and to have our experience of peace and security fully restored. Still, we know that while we live here, our experience of peace will not match what we know ought to be true.

As we consider a biblical approach to politics, it is important for us to remember that our allegiance is to Jesus alone. We fix our eyes on Him, the author and perfecter of our faith, and let go of the things that hinder us. We trust the God of the Bible, and He is always enough. But the world desires our allegiance in many ways at many levels. One of the reasons Christians were persecuted by Rome was because their other-worldly peace was perceived as a threat to the empire that demanded their allegiance.

Because Jesus' followers were so committed to God and submitting to Him, confident in their eternal destiny, and experiencing peace that transcended understanding, they were willing to stand with God no matter what the consequences. The fear that the empire used to bring people into line seemed less effective with Christians, and the empire was compelled to demonstrate power over believers. In the end, the willingness of Christ followers to die for their faith led to the conversion of the Roman empire, because the testimony of those who are willing to sacrifice all they have here is powerful — even more powerful than any demonstration of political strength. That is one reason God's people are seen as martyrs in the vision of Revelation. Like the believers in the first century, our hope is not dependent on what the "empire" does or how it rules. The Gospel's power transcends earthly politics and every earthly power. As a result, the peace of Christ can truly rule in our hearts, even while our world (or life) is in distress.

This peace God invites us into and trains us to live in affects all aspects of our lives. Our relationship with God is shaped by peace through faith in Christ (Romans 5:1-8, Ephesians 2:1-10, Colossians 2:13-15). Learning to allow this peace to impact our relationships is addressed in the household codes we find in many New Testament letters (Colossians 3:18-4:1, Ephesians 5:21-6:9, 1 Peter 2:1-3:18). We also find that this peace that comes by faith in Jesus as a result of God's grace impacts our attitudes and priorities (2 Corinthians 5:16-21, Galatians 6:1-10, Philippians 2:1-11, Colossians 3:16-17, Colossians 4:2-6, Hebrews 12:1-3). As a result, as King's kids our engagement with politics and our desire for society is driven not by fear or a need for control but by a peace-filled faith, entrusting ourselves to the God who made us on purpose and saves us, following where He leads, knowing we are with Him now and will be forever, because of the victory Jesus has already won. We may be led to engage in social issues or to lead change in society, but those efforts are rooted in a confidence that grows out of our peace and safety with God and a desire to invite others into God's grace, rather than a desperate drive to build a safe place around us with tribes, force, or other attempts for protection in this East-of-Eden world like Cain with his city in Genesis 4:13-17.


